



LAVENDER-LEMON CHEESECAKE

1 cup cream cheese, softened

1 cup butter, softened 1 1/4 cups white sugar

3 eggs

2 teaspoons vanilla

3 tablespoons lemon juice

2 1/4 cups white flour

1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder

1 tablespoon (or less, not more) dried, lavender flower buds

Preheat oven to 350F. Butter a 9 inch spring form pan. Cream the first 6 ingredients. Mix together the next three ingredients and add to the first. Pour into pan and bake for about one hour or until firm when gently pressed with your finger. Cool before removing from pan. If you wish you can drizzle with a glaze made with icing sugar, water, vanilla and 1/4 teaspoon lavender buds. Delicious!! (This recipe is from my "DOWN HOME COUNTRY COOKING" cookbook. 

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
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

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- In 1934 the Pacific Citrus Products Company wanted to add to their line-up of ice cream toppings, so they invented a fruity syrup. They marketed it to restaurants and soda fountains as a topping, and sold it to ice cream manufacturers as a base for sherbet.
- Soda jerks discovered that the syrup, when mixed with water, made a fruit-flavored drink their customers loved. The customers asked the soda jerks where they could buy the drink so they could have it at home, but it wasn't commercially available.
- Seeing the demand, the company began to market the drink in quart bottles and 46-ounce cans. The product, made from seven flavors including pineapple, passion fruit, papaya, and guava, adopted a tropical theme and became increasingly popular.
- When sales slumped, the company hired a
 public relations firm who came up with a
 new ad campaign that consisted of a cartoon
 character offering people a drink and then
 punching them in the face.
- They wanted to air the new ad on TV but they couldn't afford the advertising rates, so in 1962 they bought a single inexpensive spot on "The Tonight Show." The fruit drink was a product geared towards mothers and children, not the late-night crowd, but the show's host, Jack Paar, was so surprised by the cartoon hostility that he insisted the director run the ad a second time, for free, so he could make fun of it. This caused an unprecedented run on the product and sales never slowed from there.
- What's the name of the drink? Hawaiian Punch.

The main ingredients of the first Hawaiian Punch recipe were shipped from the Hawaiian Islands, thus the origin of the name. Today it's owned by the Plano, Texas-based Dr Pepper Snapple Group, Inc.

- Edwin Perkins was 11 years old in 1900 when a friend of his named Kitty showed him a new product, a powdered gelatin called Jell-O. Edwin was fascinated by this.
- At age 13 he responded to an ad in the back of a magazine and received a kit giving instructions in how to manufacture pre-packaged foods. Edwin was soon manufacturing all kinds of products and experimenting with new ingredients.
- Most of the products he made were things he could create using his own chemistry set. When he grew up, he married Kitty and they went into business together, producing a variety of packaged foods.
- One of his most popular products was a drink called Fruit Smack. Made from concentrated fruit syrup, it was mixed with water, poured into bottles, and corked. This was a tedious task, and the bottles often broke during shipping.
- Kitty reminded him of the powdered gelatin and wondered if he couldn't market a powdered drink

Find Creative Ways to Help Pets in Need

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: I'd like to help make life better for animals, but I'm not able to volunteer at a local shelter because my job and family take up too much time. I don't have a lot of extra cash to give away, either. Is there anything else I can do? -- Sarah in Wheeling, West Virginia

DEAR SARAH: Few of us can really dedicate the time or money we'd like to give to improve animal welfare. All we can do sometimes is look for an opportunity that fits what we are able to give. More and more individuals and businesses are coming up with creative ways for their community to help pets and their owners.

For example, a store in Fort Gratiot, Michigan, converted a walk-in cigar humidor to a pantry for donated pet food and treats, encouraging members of the community to donate to it with the goal of helping elderly residents feed their pets.

A program begun by the Humane Society of the United States, called Pets for Life, helps animal-care and social-welfare advocates start community outreach programs that can put needy pet owners in touch with agencies or charities that can help their pets get food, medical care or other assistance.

And of course, there was the community-driven assistance given to pets and rescue organizations on the Gulf Coast in the wake of two terrible hurricanes in 2017, which enabled the rescue of stranded and lost pets, and the rehoming of adoptable pets to shelters in other areas of the U.S.

So keep an ear to the ground and an eye open for the chance to help where and when you

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
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
