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TIDBITS® VISITS THE  
**THE CN TOWER**

- In 1968, the Canadian National Railway decided to build a large TV/radio communication tower to serve the Toronto area. Toronto at the time was a boomtown, and many skyscrapers had recently been erected downtown. Broadcasting into such a maze of tall buildings was difficult because the signals bounced off the walls. As a result, reception was extremely poor. What was needed was a communication tower that was taller than any of the buildings. Canadian National decided to show off the strength of Canadian industry by constructing the tallest tower in the entire world.
- Construction began in 1973. A gigantic type of mold called a slipform was made, and concrete was continuously poured into this mold. Using hydraulic jacks, the slipform was raised 6 m (20 ft) per day as the concrete set below. A team of 1,532 workers poured 40,500 cubic meters of concrete for four months until February 22, 1974. At this point the tower – still under construction – was already the tallest building in the country.
- Next the builders constructed a seven-story structure that houses observation decks, a revolving restaurant, and the broadcasting equipment. Then it was time to install the antenna.

- The antenna was originally scheduled to be winched to the top of the structure by crane, but just then a large helicopter became available, which flew the antenna to the top in 36 sections. This became a tourist attraction, and the chopper's schedule was published in the local newspapers so people could watch the spectacle. Because of the helicopter, it took only three and a half weeks to install the antenna, instead of the projected six months. The antenna, at just over 108 m (354 ft) tall, is held in place with over 40,000 bolts. When the antenna was completed, the CN Tower captured the title of World's Tallest Tower from the previous record holder, Moscow's Ostankino Tower.
- After 40 months of labor, the tower was first opened to the public on June 26, 1976, welcoming over 12,000 visitors on the first day. The CN Tower provided the entire Toronto area the clearest reception in North America, and is now used by over 30 radio and TV broadcasters, as well as cell phone and wireless data transmissions. The \$63 million cost of the tower (\$243 million in today's dollars) was recouped in about 15 years.

**WORLD'S TALLEST....?**

- Although the CN Tower contains a restaurant, a gift shop, and various observation levels, it doesn't have floors continuously from the bottom to the top, and therefore is not considered a "building." Instead, it is considered a "tower" on a par with the Eiffel Tower in Paris: a free-standing structure with a few habitable levels. (There are also "masts" which have no habitable levels at all, many of which surpass the CN Tower in height.) Defined as a tower, the CN Tower, at a total height of 553.33 m (1,814 ft), was the tallest tower in the world for over 30 years.

- It is also the tallest free-standing structure in the world, meaning anything that isn't secured by guy wires. In 2007, it was surpassed in height by the Burj Khalifa building in Dubai. In 2010, the Canton Tower in China, at 600 m (1,968 ft) became the world's tallest tower.
  - It still retains some records, however. The Horizons Restaurant is the world's highest restaurant at 346 m (1,135 ft). And in the 360 Restaurant, you'll find the world's highest wine cellar at 351 m (1,151 ft).
- TRIP TO THE TOP**
- To get to the top of the tower, six glass-walled elevators whisk visitors along one of the longest elevator hoists on the planet. It takes 58 seconds

at a speed of 22 km/hr (14 mph) to travel 346 m (1,135 ft). One elevator has a glass panel set in the floor so guests can look straight down as they go up. It's the highest glass-floored elevator in the world.

**RHUBARB-STRAWBERRY JAM**

- 3/4 cup rhubarb, washed and thinly sliced
- 1 (8 ounce) can crushed pineapple, unsweetened
- 1 quart strawberries (about 3 cups)
- 6 1/2 cups sugar
- 1 pouch liquid pectin

Put rhubarb in very large saucepan or dutch oven. Drain pineapple juice into pan with rhubarb, slowly bring to a boil. Cover and simmer for 2 minutes until rhubarb is tender. Wash berries, remove caps and crush. Combine with pineapple and rhubarb. Measure 3 1/2 cups into same pan, add sugar and mix well. Over high heat, bring to a full, rolling boil. Boil hard 1 minute stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Immediately stir in pectin. Skim off foam with metal spoon. Ladle into hot, clean jars. Quickly cover with lids. Store in cool, dry place. (It's rhubarb-strawberry season now but enjoy this jam year-round!) This recipe is from my "JAMS, JELLIES AND MARMALADES" COOKBOOK, available at many fruit stands.

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- The tower also holds the record for the tallest metal staircase: 1,776 steps to reach the main observation level, and 2,579 to go all the way to the SkyPod level. The stairs are not open to the public except for twice a year for charity stair-climbing events.
- It usually takes about half an hour to get to the top of the stairway, but the world record was a climb of 7 minutes 52 seconds, set in 1989 by Brendan Keenoy, a police officer in Ontario.
- In 2002, paralympic champion Jeff Adams climbed the stairs in a specially designed wheelchair to raise awareness of a barrier-free society. The feat took seven hours and raised over \$170,000 for charity.
- The annual stair climb fundraiser for the World Wildlife Fund attracts more than 15,000 climbers, raising over \$3 million for the cause.

**FOR THRILL SEEKERS ONLY**

- If you thrill to heights, try the Glass Floor which offers a view 342 m (1,122 feet) straight down. An expanse of glass 256 square feet is reputed to be able to hold the weight of 14 large hippos. On the same level, check out the Outdoor SkyTerrace.
- Enjoy quality dining in the 360 Restaurant, which offers panoramic views in all directions while slowly revolving in a complete circle once

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every 72 minutes. This level is 551 m (1,807 ft) off the ground.

- High above that is the SkyPod. At a height of 447 m (1,466 ft), it was once the highest public observation deck in the world until it was surpassed by the Shanghai World Financial Center in 2008. When skies are clear, you'll be able to see up to 160 km (100 miles) away, including Lake Ontario, Niagara Falls, and Rochester, NY.
- For the hard-core thrill seekers, the newly opened EdgeWalk tops all. Located just above the level of the 360 Restaurant, the EdgeWalk challenges visitors to tether themselves to an overhead rail and then step out onto a simple metal catwalk that circles the main pod at a height of 356 m (1,167 ft). There's nothing standing between you and oblivion except good sense and a stout rope. You're even encouraged to lean back over the abyss. This feature costs \$175 and includes a keepsake video, photo, and certificate of achievement.

**WORLD WONDER**

- In 1995, the CN Tower was designated a Wonder of the Modern World, sharing the honor with the Empire State Building, the Golden Gate Bridge, the English Channel Tunnel, and the Panama Canal. Almost twice as tall as the Eiffel Tower and more than three times the height of the Washington Monument, the CN Tower has earned its place among the wonders of the world.

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by insects. Bees collect nectar secreted by flowers, mix it with enzymes from their digestive tract, spit it into a honeycomb, and then dehydrate it by fanning their wings until it is reduced to about 18% water.



- Honey has equal parts of glucose and fructose. In the digestive tract, the glucose is absorbed quickly and provides immediate energy, whereas the fructose is absorbed slowly and provides sustain energy over time.
- Due to the high level of fructose, honey is about 25% sweeter than ordinary sugar. A tablespoon full of honey contains about 60 calories, which is about the same as sugar.
- Honey is fat-free and cholesterol-free and contains 22 amino acids and many essential minerals perfectly designed to maintain metabolism in the body of a bee, or human.
- There is one drawback to honey, which is that it cannot be fed to children under one year old. This is due to the risk of botulism. Botulism spores are everywhere, in the dirt, carried by the wind, blowing around as dust. When bees collect nectar, they're also collecting microscopic botulism spores and mixing them with the honey. Normally this isn't a big deal; botulism is only dangerous when it's concentrated. Adults can eat honey without fear of botulism, but babies have an underdeveloped immune system and do not develop a full complement of protective digestive bacteria until they are about a year old. Because of this, they have less resistance to botulism than adults. (cont'd)
- Does honey keep forever? Honey found in King Tut's tomb was 2,000 years old and it was still good. Honey crystallizes and solidifies over time, but reverts to its original form when the container is placed in a pot of warm water. (Be sure not to boil it, which destroys enzymes.) It keeps well in air-tight plastic or glass containers, but do not store it in metal cans because the acids in the honey will oxidize the metal, ruining the taste. It can be kept indefinitely at room temperate and can be frozen without harm, but heat ruins the nutritional value, and it's best to store it where the temperature remains constant.
- Can it be used as an effective ointment? Although bacteria usually thrive in sugary environments, honey has an acidic pH value of between 3.2 and 4.5, making it a highly unfavorable environment for bacteria. Because honey is so high in sugar and so low in water, it acts like a desiccant, drawing the water out of anything it comes into contact with, including bacteria, which die. This desiccating property of honey also means that when it's used as an ointment, it draws fluids from the wound, reducing inflammation.
- Finally, when moisture is added to honey (such



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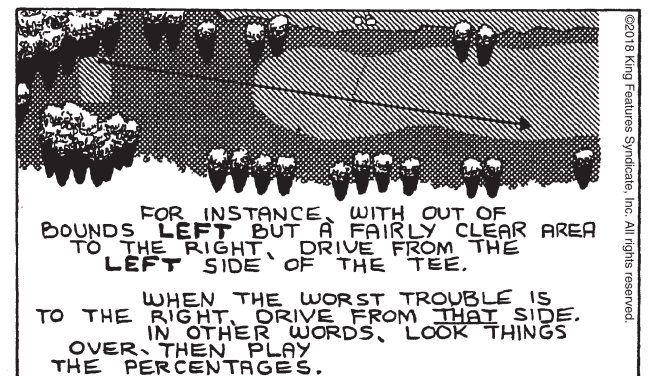
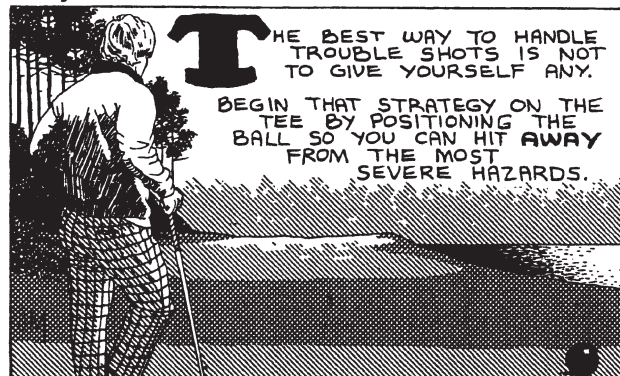
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as from a weeping wound), a chemical reaction between water and an enzyme produces hydrogen peroxide as a by-product. Hydrogen peroxide is an antiseptic. Ancient Egyptians used honey for all manner of problems, and during World War I, honey mixed with castor oil was used to treat battlefield injuries. It's effective for treating bedsores, burns, sunburns, cuts, scrapes, rashes and so forth.

- While enjoying your honey, keep in mind that the total output over the lifetime of a single honey bee might equal 1/12th of a teaspoon. To make one pound of honey, bees in a colony must visit about 2 million flowers and fly over 55,000 miles.

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## TIDBITS GOES LONG.....

In 1979, Dar Robinson jumped from the top of the main pod (347.37 m) with a parachute for the movie "Highpoint" starring Christopher Plummer. Dar Robinson later returned to perform a controlled cable fall filmed for the TV show "That's Incredible".

### THE DEMPSTER DUMPSTER

- George Dempster was born in Knoxville, Tennessee in 1887, one of 11 children born to immigrant parents. When he was 19, he went to Panama with his brother to work on the Panama Canal. He was particularly talented at handling the gigantic steam shovels. He even re-designed his steam shovel, improving it so that the bucket, once it was filled, would self-empty. His bosses were impressed and every single steam shovel was re-built following his design.
- When George and his brother returned to Tennessee, they started a company named after themselves: The Dempster Construction Company. They built roads, dams, and railways. By 1922 they owned 26 steam shovels including the largest strip-mining shovel in the world at the time. Things were really going well, but then the Great Depression hit. George Dempster watched as the luxurious home he had built was auctioned to the highest bidder to satisfy company debts. But he did not give up.
- Instead, he brought in two more of his brothers, reorganized, and formed the Dempster Machinery Company, focusing on building large construction machines, with construction jobs relegated as a side-line.
- One of the biggest headaches of owning a construction firm was hauling away the waste generated which had to be loaded onto dump trucks. What he really needed was a way to easily dispose of huge amounts of garbage. He went to work designing something that could do that. In 1935 he built the first unit, dubbing it the "Dempster-Dumpster," a word he invented using his name and the word "dump." The Dempster Dumpster was a specially designed truck that could lift a specially designed container over its head, dumping tons of refuse into the rear of the truck, then crushing it before unloading it.
- Dempster Dumpsters reduced the cost of collecting, hauling and dumping garbage more than 75% compared to the cost of performing the task with conventional dump trucks. George Dempster designed and built models capable of handling a 38,000-lb net load, plus the two ton weight of the container, all on a single-axle heavy-duty truck. By 1939 the company was also manufacturing the Dempster-Balester, a hydraulic machine capable of crushing and bailing an entire car into a billet for shipping.
- He designed the Dempster Dumpster to make things easier for his own construction company, but once other rival companies got a look at it, they wanted Dempster Dumpsters for themselves. Soon, municipalities started putting in orders, because it beat the current method of having garbage men manually empty garbage cans into the back of dump trucks. Dempster advertised the product as being "rat-proof, wind-proof, fly-proof, fire-proof, and scavenger-proof."
- Before long, the five Dempster brothers were spending their entire time turning out Dumpsters at Dempster Brothers, Inc. Work with the U.S. Navy resulted in Dempster's equipment being used all over the world. In fact, there were 125 Dumpsters on the docks in Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941.
- By the 1950s, his company employed over 450 people and was grossing over \$6 million a year.
- By the end of his career he would hold over 75 patents. By the time he died of a heart attack in 1964, the word "Dumpster" which he had coined was used as commonly as other corporate names such as "Kleenex" or "Xerox" or "Band-aid." Dumpsters are now found in every city all over the world.

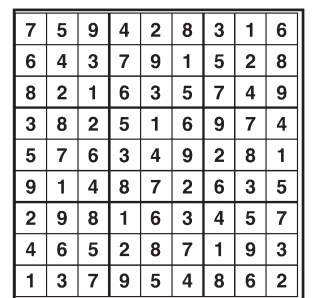
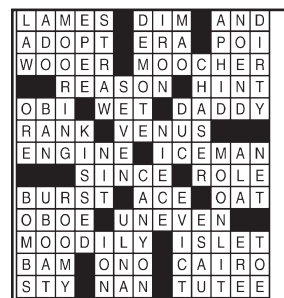
